Over 100 female Members of Parliament from around the world met in the House of Commons on Thursday 8 November as part of the celebrations for the centenary of suffrage for some women, and the right for women to stand for election in the UK. The conference celebrated the progress made in advancing women's rights to participate in public life, and the improvement to the lives of women and girls around the world.
